RESTORE: preparing for the future

With funding from LIFE+ and the Environment Agency (UK) managing the partnership, RESTORE began life in 2010 with 6 European partners and a brief to make connections between river restoration professionals in Europe.

In December 2013 RESTORE will be wrapping up and many of you are wondering what we will be doing with the tools we've developed in the past 3 years.

Since RESTORE began we have developed a <u>website</u> and a <u>RiverWiki</u>, published a monthly bulletin, written <u>Rivers by Design</u>, reviewed <u>EU Policy Drivers for River Restoration</u> we've organised many, many events, fieldtrips, workshops and we've held a remarkable and motivating European conference in Vienna.

EU Environment Commissioner Janez Potočnik was impressed by the growing body of knowledge and good practice examples that has been brought together that is essential to support the implementation of many EU policy objectives.

This is our last RESTORE bulletin, but the ECRR will keep you updated through their newsletter (please tell us if you don't want to receive this in future). Our website will also be managed by <u>ECRR</u> who will continue to update it and maintain. Have you looked at our 'How to River Restoration pages' or perhaps the <u>new guidance and case studies on environment improvements</u> that we are hosting? The really valuable and still growing repository of case studies is held in our RiverWiki. This is like Wikipedia so please add your case study. *Rivers by Design* will be updated by December and readers will still be able to download it directly from our website. Our partners will continue to hold events relating to river restoration and their contact details will remain on the website.

We hope we've met the brief we set ourselves, in fact we hope we've exceeded it. We couldn't have done this without our partners: Italian Centre for River Restoration (CIRF)
Finnish Environment Institute (SYKE) , River Restoration Centre (RRC), Government
Service for Land and Water Management (DLG), Wetlands International. The European
Centre for River Restoration (ECRR) has provided essential support to RESTORE as a member of the Advisory Board. A particular thank you for Bart Fokkens who chairs the ECRR.

Thank you to everyone who has helped us establish our networks and to raise the profile of river restoration in Europe.

We have one more surprise for you which is the forthcoming Layman's Report 'Rivers – the art of the possible'. which will provide you with a summary of the findings and outcomes from the RESTORE project.

Ensuring fish migration in Romania

Dr. Ecaterina Luca of the National Institute of Hydrology and Water Management has written about Romania's experience in ensuring the migration of fish. Her paper discusses hydrological connectivity and also explores recent Romanian achievements in the construction of fish ladders.

Final Finnish seminar

In August 150 river restoration experts came together from Norway, Sweden, Estonia, Poland and Finland to participate in the North Regions' RESTORE Final Seminar in Lahti.

The seminar wrapped up the best approaches and restoration case studies in the northern region. The need for standardised monitoring, prioritisation measures and new restoration approaches, such as guiding dynamic erosion processes in Poland, were presented. Environmental flow, nature-like fish passages and side channels, to increase the reproduction of migratory fish stocks were also highlighted. Participants also discussed the necessity of using of green infrastructure for urban watercourses in future.

The new Finnish Watercourse Restoration Network held its third seminar at the event and the award for the year's best restoration scheme was given during a boat trip along Lake Vesijärvi.
